

27th TOMCC NZ National Rally - PLEASE READ

As you will have noticed over the years, we in the Otago Southland Area tend to do things in our own style.

Based on our local motto, "Keep 'em running", our focus is riding our Triumphs as often as we can and so it is that we have organised next year's rally in our own southern style. This approach seems to have paid off as, at the time of printing, a large number of beds have already been booked.

At the previous AGM we offered to take on this task in the absence of any other Area willing to do so, although after we had returned home we did get notification that the Auckland Area had considered hosting the rally, but have decided instead to host the 2022 national rally.

On the way back from this year's rally, John and I took the long road home to check out venues for next year's rally. Hari Hari, Haast and Makarora were all considered. A little later we looked at Mosgiel, Twizel and Otematata, and also considered organising a "Rolling Rally", but that's for another day. In the end finally settling on Lakeview Kiwi Holiday Park in Te Anau.

Much of the correspondence with all the above venues took place over the China virus lockdown periods. It became painfully apparent just how difficult it was for the management of these places to plan ahead or even just

to stay in business which in turn delayed our ability to make a long-term decision on the most suitable venue. Thank you to those of you who showed patience and respected the plight of fellow New Zealanders, whilst waiting for us to make a decision.

So, Te Anau it is, and we're confident that you'll be impressed with our choice of accommodation. We have a large area allocated exclusively for us with an ample number of beds to suit all budgets, with plenty of room for the bikes and lots of space for camping or caravans.

There are two kitchens, one is just for our meal caterers, the talented ladies of the Te Anau Lions Club (rembember the superb meals at our 2010 rally in Mosgiel), the other kitchen will be for those who want to prepare their own meals. There will also be a cash bar in the dining area. **No eftpos or credit card facility,** so make sure you have plenty of small change with you.

Details of meals and costs are on the enclosed registration form, which is also available on our website, www.tomcc. co.nz. Tea and coffee will be available in several locations

The Saturday ride will be into Milford Sound. This will be a long ride, a 240km return journey and you will need to allow about four hours, allowing for traffic, tourist buses and possible bad weather. But regardless of weather, it is a superbride and really worth the effort. If your bike has a small tank we advise you to take fuel with you as the only fuel pumps at Milford are not always functioning.

Also, we advise you to start your trip south with a good set of tyres as most South Island roads use a coarse chip which is quite hard on tyres.

There are a number of other attractions in Te Anau ("Gateway to Fiordland") for those who choose not to go out riding – the Te Anau and Manapouri lakes, fishing, plane and helicopter flights, boat trips, walks or just chill out in the Te Anau township.

There will be a bike show after the Saturday ride but please note that only bikes ridden from the owner's address will be eligible for bike show prizes. As usual all motorcyclists are welcome to attend the rally which starts at 12 midday, 19 February 2021.

We look forward to seeing you all in Te Anau.

A rare Seeley T150

I bought this bike 2 years ago from an importer here in Christchurch who had purchased it at an auction in the USA. I knew it was quite special and relatively rare.

Back in the early 70's or possibly '69 Boyer Bransden commissioned Colin Seeley to build, as far as I know, 8 bikes fitted with T150 engines and electronic ignitions to launch their early systems. From what I have been told a person who worked for either Johnson Motors or Ross Racing where the bikes went to, contacted Collin to see if he would build an extra one for him as he liked the sound of what was being built and did a bit of road racing himself. Colin agreed providing he supplied a motor, and pointed out it wouldn't be fitted with the new electronic ignition. The motor supplied was a very early one, being T150T, number 328, they started at 101.

After the very enjoyable WATOC Rally hosted by TOMCC NZ Canterbury Area last year, a group of UK visitors/attendees at the Rally came to our workshop for a look and one the guy's, Tony Page,





paid particular attention to the Seeley telling me he was a personal friend of Collin's. He took photos of the bike, particularly the frame and swing arm and showed them to Collin on his return to the UK. Shortly after, I received an email with a hand written letter from Collin confirming it was definitely one of his builds

This Bike was built without an electronic ignition in it and has been, as I understand, unaccounted for until now, as all the other Bikes are accounted for. As a result of these being built Collin went on to design and build the first of the trellis frames for Ducati and you can see definite similarities there.

Recently I decided to have it professionally restored and it is Currently with highly respected classic racer, bike builder and engine tuner, Gary Cotterall.

I will update the photo's when the Bike is completed and ready for action.



Although both bikes have the new owner's finger print on them we still refer to them as Claire's bikes, force of habit I think.

On the day of the run we met up the road from Al's place with the weather threatening to turn bad. On my way there I'd stopped to gas up, went to kick Bob back into life and the kick start spring snapped! Immediately I knew Claire was with us!

The broken kick start spring reminded me of years before, in 1996 I think, when Claire, Des Gifkins, Bryn Darby and myself had ridden down to the cold duck rally in Waipawa 480km from Auckland. Claire I think was on her '56 pre-unit café racer, Des on his '73 T120V, Bryn on a Honda ST and myself on my '55 T110.

Anyhow, not far out from the rally I hear a sudden grinding noise coming from my '55. Stopped to have a look and the kick start spring had broken. Claire was working for NZ post at the time and had these big rubber bands, they were used to fix my kick start, and that was what made me feel that Claire was on the ride with us, just a gentle reminder of her looking on.

10 bikes departed from Royal Rd and we headed up SH1 to Wellsford to meet up with 10 of the Northland guys. Off we head to do a loop

through Mungawahi and stopping at Claire's old place for a look and a rev of the bikes. Followed by a stop at the 3 Furlongs in Kaiwaka for a beer and bite to eat. Al had brought Claire's photo albums for us to all to have a look through.


