Voting for club officers for 2023

The procedure for you to vote for club officers

- 1. Choose who you wish to vote for from the nominee column in the list. That is one vote for each position having one or more
- 2. Send your votes to your Area Coordinator by one of three ways: By email (the preferred option) or by post in a letter or at a meeting, called for this purpose.

For the purpose of emailed and postal votes the final date for receiving votes will be the date of an area meeting called for the purpose

Your Area Co-ordinator will then combine all the votes from within their area. These will be recorded on an Accumulated voting paper which your Area Co-ordinator will have in due course. This will then be submitted to the returning officer in this case our TOMCC NZ National newsletter editor.

Notification of a meeting for the purpose of voting, must be sent by the Area Coordinator to all members.

Please note that you do not have to attend a meeting to cast a vote, this can be done by email or post.

It is preferred that voting be carried out by email or post as this allows members to make their own private choice without pressure or undue influence from other members.



1938 Triumph T70 restoration finally underway



Bill is my name and I'm fairly new to the Triumph Motorcycle Family. I don't use the word family lightly in this context either as you will see should you care to read on.

In 1990 my father then two years into his journey with terminal cancer took me down into his basement at his home in Tauranga where he began showing where various parts of a 1938 Triumph T70 were located. Asking him why he was doing this his reply "I saw the amazing resto you did on that prewar



chain trike for Benn (my son) and I won't have enough time to finish this as I want to focus on the 1934 Motoguzzi GTS (being one of 1500 built) if I gave it to you would you restore it? My answer was obvious, of course.

Fast forward 20 years and my mum is in care, the house empty, I better get up there from my home in Christchurch and box up all the parts for shipping. Upon entering my late dad's inner sanctum it became apparent Continued on next page

that someone with very light fingers and a liking for prewar Triumphs had been pilfering parts of the bike which amounted to most of the original engine, NOS tank, tank panel complete front and rear guards, headlight shell, rebuilt magdyno etc. I was pretty devastated at the time but with the help of my younger brother I boxed up all we could find and sent it home to Christchurch.

Mum passed away three years later and three years on from mum's passing I packed up all my stuff and moved to the Mackenzie area. Upon looking over the basket case Triumph I began to get a bit concerned. I'm pretty handy with the wrenches but knew it would take me forever to restore the engine, gearbox, carb and magdyno but I could handle the rest of it ok.



During this time two friends who did know how to do the hard stuff passed suddenly so I thought I'd better get my butt into gear. Thankfully the TOMCC NZ were such a help with introducing me to a great guy, Bruce Miller in Invercargill, who is presently working on the engine. Amongst the many boxes of this basket case bike we found some parts that were missed in the cherrypicking job; a reconditioned gearbox, carbs and another magdyno but with some missing components and many other parts some Triumph some not, luckily nothing we couldn't replace.

To say the thief knew what they were after was an understatement as most of the engine parts stolen were the hardest to find like pushrods, pushrod tubes, conrod and cam followers as well as the best of the rocker boxes with cover, the 19T primary drive sprocket, which I believe is the Val Page three lobe, was taken leaving the part that has the drive splines (must have had one). This is where I come back to the word Family especially the Triumph family as without the help of you I wouldn't now be so close to having a viable engine again, I'm grateful and humbled by your help.

There is much to be done, this will be more of a rustoration not concourse, but with many parts to find and restore I'm feeling like the bike will have a rideable future again and I will have lived up to my agreement to my late father. I'll keep you all in the loop with progress over time but here are a few pics of progress to date.

Journey's start was on a Wednesday with a first ride to Paraparaumu of about 550km. Stayed at my mates with a 6am start to ride to the ferry on Thursday – just four of us. First overnight stip was where the Conway river crosses SH1. It's where the Tough Nuts rally used to be held. A great spot that Liz uses as a Bike Pit Stop and Air B&B.

Set off on Friday morning for Waimate, but only got as far as Winchester before Liz's V8 trike started to play up. While waiting for the tow truck to take it back to Christchurch, a friend came up and towed Liz's camper trailer to the March Hare Rally in Waimate. This is, as I am sure you know a great rally, very well done with heaps of people, bikes, great bands and other good stuff.

Back north on Sunday where I peeled off at Kaiapoi to visit friends as the others headed home. I came up a couple of days later and stayed at Conway River again as it is an easy ride to the ferry (about 30km S of Kaikoura) Caught the afternoon ferry and following an overnight stop at a mates in Waikanae I was back home again the next day. The 10 days mileage was 2483km.

Was home for a day before house sitting for my ex for a week. The day after she got back I was off again, this time for the Pike River 29th Memorial ride. Again down to Waikanae first day, early ferry and a ride to Ross on Friday staying at the Imperial Hotel in Ross. Great place, great people.

This is the memorial ride for the True 29 tribute as there is now a Miner's Memorial Run the following week. Saturday was run day. I lost track of the exact route we took but did go through Westport, Reefton, Hokitika, Charleston, Berlins and into the Buller Gorge

- about a 300km day.





The weather leading up to this day had been unsettled to say the least, but with covid postponing the event twice before, I was aware the Club was determined to run the event this time round regardless.

I headed up to Wairoa on the Friday with my wife Kelly giving me the ok to take her '73 Trident. It has been some years since I've done any sort of serious mileage on a Trident and it did take some time to get in the zone (only once though trying to put the brake in gear). While it threatened to rain heavily the whole trip, I got to Wairoa dry with the Trident going and handling well.

While I had plenty of offers of places to stay, I decided to stay at the motor camp in one of the cabins for a quiet night. This is a gem of a place, walking distance to town, super clean and tidy, and extremely affordable.

I took the bike to Richard's place to store it for the night. He had his own two Tridents in the shed as well as two others belonging to fellow Wairoa BMC members, all highly polished and ready for the following day. Two other guys arrived from the Bay of Plenty who were staying with Richard, one with a X75 the other with an LP Williams Legend which I was very keen to see in person. The Legend is believed to be the only one in New Zealand of the 60 made, and it certainly did not disappoint. The owners happily answered all the questions I had regarding their two immaculate machines. The X75 was purchased in boxes and is a beautiful restoration.

Up early in the morning and it was raining. A quick walk around town and off to collect the Trident and down to the club rooms. All present were confident the weather would come right and so it proved. The steady trickle of triples turned into something of a flood and by the end of the day there were fourteen T150s, seven T160s, two X75 Hurricanes, 4 race bikes, the Legend and one BSA Rocket Three had rolled in, coupled with a very nice T140D, and three other 750 Triumph twins including a 77 Bonnie retrofitted with a big set of bars, together with various Hinckley Triumphs and Harleys.


Grant Walsh firing up his Rob North racing Trident certainly was a crowd pleaser and the noise was incredible.



Gone, Like the Darkness at Dawn - Moose Safari 2022

After the Moose disappeared into the forest, the strange tale of the southern hemisphere's only moose population, (that had entered the realm of New Zealand folklore) was reignited again with the Otago & Southland Chapter of TOMCC NZ's Southern Moose Safari. This bi-annual event is all about encouraging intrepid members from throughout the country into riding Triumph motorcycles into the land of doing without - Gunn Country - the wild south western corner of the South Island in the search and capture, "Dead or a Alive", of a Moose for the fame and sizeable bounties offered. Or better still just getting to ride Triumph's way, way out there. The stories abound in previous issues of Triumph Times of those who have gone before and entered into the spirit of the adventure.

This year we had a couple of guest riders, Marten & Leona, who entered on a Tiger 1050, seeking the rewards of a great adventure. Further eager hunters were Dr Pat and Liz on a 1200 Scrambler providing further off road capability; Ken with the very nimble SE Bonneville; Mike with the 1600 Thunderbird for the load carrying capacity and power to carry out a Moose, and finally John (head Moose hunter) with a '79 Tiger as this year is the year of the Tiger.

Unfortunately, Johnny, Simon and Bill where unable to attend. Johnny having been run down in a hit and run a couple of days prior and Simon struck down by a virus. Thankfully all are recovering and will be be back in the saddle soon.

The weather gods were playing ball for the first two days with clear skies making the run in and out of Milford on the Sunday brilliant from a riding prospective. On a fine day the Milford ride would have to be one of the best in NZ. Bikes stripped down to bare essentials, tools and of course wets in the unlikely event of rain or snow, and yes it has snowed on one of the rides.

First stop at Eglington Valley for a regroup and scouting the valley floor for any sightings of moose coming out of the edges of the bush. Non seen so moving on at a sedate pace and ever watchful through the forests changing from red beech of the low lands to silver and mountain beech as we climbed up to the divide with the occasional stop. Having crossed over the divide now entering the alpine area heading up to the Homer tunnel with a brief stop at the entrance with Keas jumping up on bikes and chewing at speedo mounting rubber's, being one the their favourite snacks on bikes. One wonders why birds go extinct, is it because they tasted so damned good? Could see a couple thinking of Kea burgers as their bikes are being chewed to pieces.

Our return ride took in Mitre Peak once again. This time for a photo session at the airfield with Mitre Peak in the background to celebrate 120 years of Triumph Motor Cycles – see page one.

Once back out through the tunnel, a change of direction took us up the gravelled Hollyford Valley Road to Gunns Camp – or rather what was left of it! In 2020 the camp in the mid Hollyford Valley was engulfed in a land slide with millions of tons from Ocean Peak at 1848m taking a brutal journey to the valley floor after 40 hours of heavy rain. Our Otago & Southland Chapter of TOMCC NZ being possibly one of the last motorcycle clubs to have held an overnighter there in December 2019.

Riding in there were a couple of new bridges in place. The road beside the camp had been cleared with the spoil heaped over to the side of the road, with no consideration to the camp, adding to the avalance debris already there. Some of the building remain, but amazingly one of the few things missed by the slip was the meeting area and chairs up the hill side. So an unscheduled Otago Southland Area meeting took place, albeit rather briefly.

Eager to explore further, Pat & Liz scooted on off up the track on the Scrambler to check out the end of the road which apparently terminates at a narrow swing bridge. So, being footloose and fancy free they immediately enjoyed a short romantic bush walk.

On the way out, and being ever so vigilant our intrepid hunters cast an eye out for the elusive Moose – and there – was it a trick of the light or a glimpse across a valley floor? The chase was on sending an old Tiger off like a scalded cat! With its long legs, passing and spurring into action an SE Bonnie, both howling full throttle across the valley! At 120mph, boy, that Moose could really move!

Leona and Marten who had parked up ahead were holding back startled and bewildered tourists on the side of the road, until they themselves took off with the second Tiger to enter the chase covering tourists in dust, noise and confusion. 
Now back in civilization some mention was made of speed but one replied they were to busy hanging on to look at the speedo.


